Murmuring Bosk

For Banjo and Marimba

5-String Banjo (Standard G Tuning) Marimba (4.5 Octave)

Program Notes:

During a pleasant walk in the woods, you come across an idyllic clearing. As the leaves and branches rustle in the gentle breeze, it feels like the trees themselves are chattering and gossipping about you being there. When the wind picks up and dark clouds roll overhead, an argument breaks out and leads to new conversation. Eventually, the trees remember you're there and shyly go back to their quiet murmurs.

Performance Notes:

Both: Whenever the first melody appears, it should be played with a slight fade in over the triplets. In the build to 88, the quarter note triplets should start to be felt as eighth notes in the new tempo. Likewise, in the transition at 115, the sixteenths should be felt as triplet eighths in the first tempo.

Banjo: Try to sustain notes and pronouce the slides as much as possible. Especially when playing the back-up part, sustaining the notes will contrast with the dead strokes in the marimba. Throughout, any slides notated without a slur should be rearticulated on the end note. At 46, the eighths should be played as a bend up and back in rhythm.

Marimba: In the first back-up part, the staccato chords should be played as dead strokes. Be very, very careful not to rush the new tempo at 88. Very careful. The final rolled chord should be played almost lazily, with a slower roll speed and a gentle fade over several seconds.

About the Composer:
